## **PASTOR'S NOTES:**

Today is the last day for the 5 P.M. Sunday Mass. Change is sometimes difficult, but we hope that those who had been attending that Mass will be able to attend one of the other three here. This will also be the last day for the "second collection" for the teachers and staff, since there is now an envelope every month in the packet for this purpose. This second collection was started several years ago for the very worthy purpose of providing our fine teachers and staff something "extra" a couple of times There have been many worthy fundraising activities in our parish, but the gist of the strategic plan is to coordinate, consolidate, and control some of these things so that we can get a clearer picture of where we are and where we are headed. This effort at "strategic planning"—which basically means having a road map, because we cannot get anywhere unless we know where we want to go and how to get there--started in the school (due to the way the diocese set it up for us), but we are trying to extend the process to the parish at large, at least to a certain extent. An example of "coordinate" is the "meeting of the minds" of our finance committee, parish council, school advisory board, and the chairmen of the five "pillars" in the plan to make sure all of us know the roles our groups play in the whole picture. An example of "consolidate" was the effort to bring all financial accounts of various groups into many fewer ones, so that we can have a better "cash flow" to pay salaries and our bills. An example of "control" is the effort discussed at parish council about having some kind of "gatekeeper" system so that the many worthy causes that are around do not degenerate into the "den of thieves" (not that anyone here is dishonest) in the Commons area that the Lord had to clear out of the Temple in Jerusalem. I will admit that this "coordinate-consolidate-control" way of looking at things is of my own construction, but it is based on what I have heard from many people at many meetings and seems to summarize some of the efforts already underway when I came here.

We have already begun working with our school families to help all of them become as accountable for their children's education as some (in fact, many) of them

already are. We are going to be doing the same with the rest of the parish as well. This will involve what is called (in the Bible) "stewardship." This is sometimes confused with raising money—that will happen when the principle is explained and understood—but it is something that could be better understood as "a way of life." It involves learning to see our time, talent, and treasures as things given to us "on loan" by God to use for our own needs and the needs of our families, but also for the building up of the Kingdom of God. When we have 40% of the families that are registered here that are apparently not engaged in any way, there is a challenge for us. This is not just the priest's challenge, for each one of us is called to "go out to all the world" by our baptism, not just one of us. We cannot do what we are called and able to do without the engagement of all here. That is the challenge that Jesus left us, for the truth is that we are not here just to be "fed" spiritually, as many people describe it today, but to feedto feed others, not only in our own community, but in the community at large. Our parish was not designed to be a "gas station" for spiritual needs only, but a launching pad to the heavens. This challenge is not unique to the Church of the Holy Spirit or to the Catholic Church, but is a challenge found in our country by all believers in these early years of the third millenium. Jesus Christ is not just a "nice man," but He is God and He is risen from the dead and He is here in our midst, wanting us to bring to others the spiritual treasures that we already enjoy—to bring Him! That is why we have a school, and that is why, even more basically, we have a parish. If we can manage to harness and direct some of the good will and passion and energy that I have seen so abundantly around here since I came, it will make the splitting of the atom seem like small potatoes.

The Mass on Monday, Labor Day, is at 8:10 A.M. It is a chance for us to give thanks to the Lord for the blessings of human labor—our own and that of our brothers and sisters. Each of us has a contribution to the larger human family that we make by our work. God bless!
